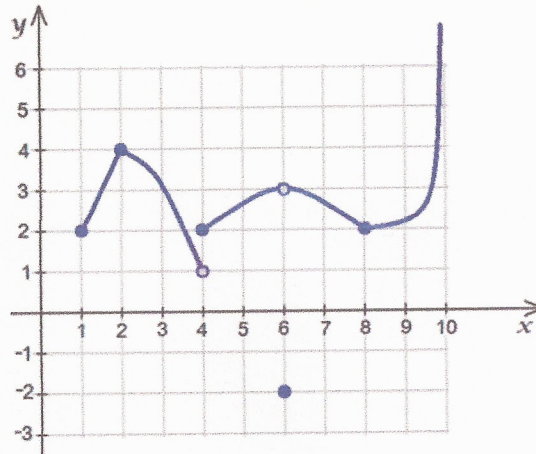

1. (12 points) (1 point each) Determine each of the following based on the picture of the function $f(x)$ shown below.



(a) $\lim_{x \rightarrow 1^+} f(x) = 2$

(b) $\lim_{x \rightarrow 2} f(x) = 4$

(c) $f(2) = 4$

(d) Is the function continuous at $x = 2$? Yes

(e) $\lim_{x \rightarrow 4} f(x)$ DNE

(f) $f(4) = 2$

(g) Is the function continuous at $x = 4$?

No, jump discontinuity

(h) $\lim_{x \rightarrow 6} f(x) = 3$

(i) $f(6) = -2$

(j) Is the function continuous at $x = 6$?

No, removable discontinuity

(k) $\lim_{x \rightarrow 8} f(x) = 2$

(l) $\lim_{x \rightarrow 10^-} f(x) = \infty$

2. (15 points) Evaluate the following limits. If the limit is infinite, state whether it is ∞ or $-\infty$. Justify your answers.

(a) (5 points) $\lim_{x \rightarrow 3} \frac{x^2 + x - 12}{3x - 9}$ of type $\frac{0}{0}$

factor

$$= \lim_{x \rightarrow 3} \frac{(x+4)(x-3)}{3(x-3)} = \boxed{\frac{7}{3}}$$

(b) (5 points) $\lim_{x \rightarrow 8} \frac{\sqrt{x+1} - 3}{x - 8}$ of type $\frac{0}{0}$

use conjugate

$$= \lim_{x \rightarrow 8} \frac{(\sqrt{x+1} - 3)(\sqrt{x+1} + 3)}{(x-8)(\sqrt{x+1} + 3)}$$

$$= \lim_{x \rightarrow 8} \frac{x-8}{(x-8)(\sqrt{x+1} + 3)} = \frac{1}{3+3} = \boxed{\frac{1}{6}}$$

(c) (5 points) $\lim_{x \rightarrow 4^-} \frac{x-10}{x-4}$ of type $\frac{-6}{0^-}$

since $x \rightarrow 4^- \Rightarrow x < 4 \Rightarrow x-4 < 0$

$$= \boxed{+\infty}$$

3. (10 points) Use the **limit definition** of the derivative to compute $f'(x)$ where $f(x) = 3x^2 + 4$. No other methods will earn points. Show all your work!

$$\begin{aligned} f'(x) &= \lim_{h \rightarrow 0} \frac{f(x+h) - f(x)}{h} \\ &= \lim_{h \rightarrow 0} \frac{(3(x+h)^2 + 4) - (3x^2 + 4)}{h} \\ &= \lim_{h \rightarrow 0} \frac{\cancel{3x^2} + 6xh + 3h^2 - \cancel{3x^2}}{h} \\ &= \lim_{h \rightarrow 0} 6x + 3h \\ &= \boxed{6x} \end{aligned}$$

4. (6 points) Show that $\lim_{x \rightarrow 0} \left[x^6 \cos \left(\frac{1}{x^6} \right) \right] = 0$ by filling in the blanks below.

For all $x \neq 0$, we know that: $\underline{-1} \leq \cos \left(\frac{1}{x^6} \right) \leq \underline{+1}$

Note that $x^6 \geq 0$ for all x . Then multiplying the inequality by x^6 yields:

$$\underline{-x^6} \leq x^6 \cos \left(\frac{1}{x^6} \right) \leq \underline{x^6}$$

The squeeze theorem implies that:

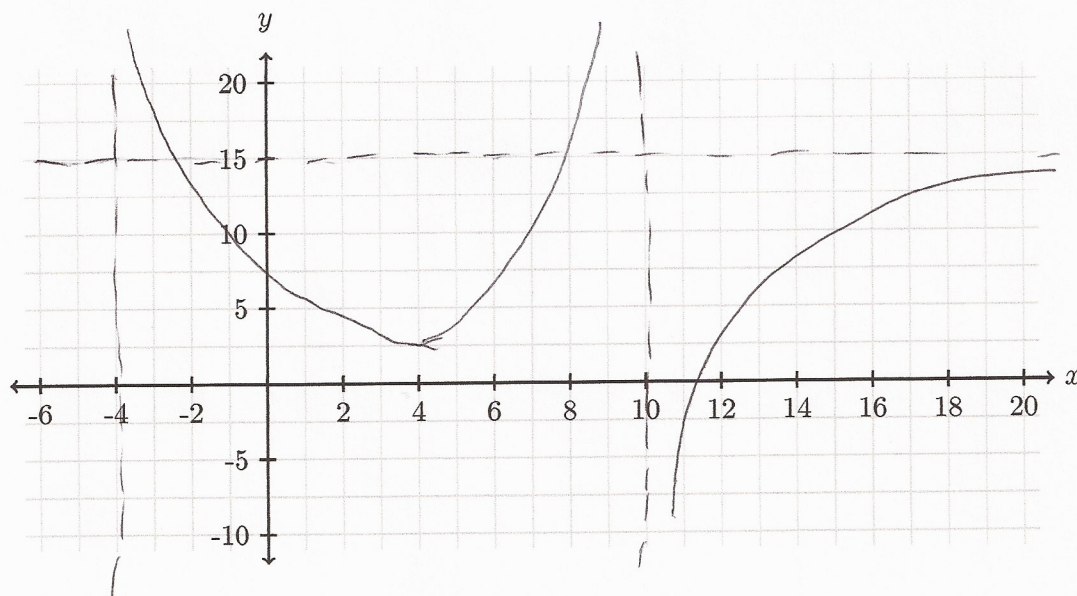
$$\underline{\lim_{x \rightarrow 0} -x^6} \leq \lim_{x \rightarrow 0} \left[x^6 \cos \left(\frac{1}{x^6} \right) \right] \leq \underline{\lim_{x \rightarrow 0} x^6}$$

The limits on the left and right of the inequality are both 0, we conclude that: $\lim_{x \rightarrow 0} \left[x^6 \cos \left(\frac{1}{x^6} \right) \right] = 0$

5. (8 points) Suppose f is a function with the following properties:

- $\lim_{x \rightarrow 10^-} f(x) = \infty$
- $\lim_{x \rightarrow 10^+} f(x) = -\infty$
- $\lim_{x \rightarrow \infty} f(x) = 15$
- $\lim_{x \rightarrow -4^+} f(x) = \infty$

Sketch a possible graph of $y = f(x)$.



6. (15 points) Find the derivatives of the following functions. No need to simplify!

(a) (5 points) $f(x) = e^{5x} \left(\frac{2}{x} + 4\sqrt{x} \right)$ use product rule

$$f' = \left(5e^{5x} \left(\frac{2}{x} + 4\sqrt{x} \right) \right) + \left(e^{5x} \left(-\frac{2}{x^2} + \frac{2}{\sqrt{x}} \right) \right)$$

$$\begin{aligned} u &= e^{5x} & v &= \frac{2}{x} + 4\sqrt{x} \\ u' &= 5e^{5x} & v' &= -\frac{2}{x^2} + \frac{2}{\sqrt{x}} \end{aligned}$$

(b) (5 points) $g(t) = \frac{1+t^3}{5-t^2}$ use quotient rule

$$g'(t) = \frac{3t^2(5-t^2) - (1+t^3)(-2t)}{(5-t^2)^2}$$

$$\begin{aligned} u &= 1+t^3 & v &= 5-t^2 \\ u' &= 3t^2 & v' &= -2t \end{aligned}$$

(c) (5 points) $h(\theta) = \tan(\sqrt{\theta})$ use chain rule

$$h'(\theta) = \sec^2(\sqrt{\theta}) \cdot \frac{1}{2\sqrt{\theta}}$$

9. (16 points) Circle the correct answers.

(a) The limit $\lim_{x \rightarrow \infty} \frac{5x^2 + 10x + 1}{x^3 - 4}$ is equal to:

$$= \lim_{x \rightarrow \infty} \frac{\frac{5}{x} + \frac{10}{x^2} + \frac{1}{x^3}}{1 - \frac{4}{x^3}} = \frac{0}{1} = 0$$

(i) 0

(ii) 5

(iii) ∞

(iv) None of these answers

(b) If f is a continuous function on $[1, 4]$ such that $f(1) = -2$, $f(4) = 3$, then by the Intermediate Value Theorem there is a c in $(1, 4)$ with $f(c) = 1$.

($c=1$ between $f(1)=-2$
 $\& f(4)=3$)

(i) True

(ii) False

(iii) Not enough information given

(c) If f is a differentiable function on $[1, 5]$ such that $f(3) = 5$, $f'(3) = 2$, then an equation of the tangent line is given by:

$$y - 5 = 2(x - 3)$$

$$y = 2x - 6 + 5$$

(i) $y = 2x - 1$ (ii) $y = 2x + 5$ (iii) $y = 2x + 10$ (iv) $y = 3x - 5$ (d) A function $h(x)$ is defined by $h(x) = (f(x))^3$.Suppose we know that $f(1) = 2$, and $f'(1) = 10$, find $h'(1)$.

$$h' = 3(f(x))^2 \cdot (f'(x))$$

$$h'(1) = 3 \cdot 4 \cdot 10 = 12 \cdot 10 = 120$$
